Many families select a family child care provider to care for their children. In New Jersey, Family Child Care is a voluntary registration program in which providers can care for up to 5 children in their home for a fee. Registered family child care providers have completed an application process, attended mandatory training, have a health and safety home inspection, and offer an educational program for children. The provider's home is registered with the state of New Jersey. Family child care providers can gain accreditation through the National Association of Family Child Care by meeting higher standards of quality.
